A Ray of Sunshine

hen you meet Aaron the first thing you notice is his smile that absolutely lights up a room. He is a happy-go-lucky five-year-old boy with a sparkle in his eye. Like other five year olds, Aaron loves to play with building blocks, cars, listen to music, read books, watch Curious George, and ride a bike. In fact, Aaron was the recipient of an AmTryke from the Adaptive Recreation Program featured in our last issue. Aaron attends preschool three hours a day where he is learning numbers and colors in preparation for his entrance into Kindergarten next school year. Aaron enjoys all the things other five year olds do, with a brilliant smile that never leaves his face, and all the while facing a complex health condition known as Undefined Leukodystrophy.

Leukodystrophies are rare, incurable, neurological diseases that affect the cells of the brain. In Aaron's case, the type of Leukodystrophy he has is "Undefined" because doctors have not discovered what caused this to happen to his brain. This genetic disease attacks the myelin or "insulating rubber sheath" surrounding neurons in the brain, which leads to deteriorating health for affected children. Some of the symptoms children with this disease experience are a decrease in motor skills, spasticity, muscle rigidity, changes in cognition and language, problems with feeding and swallowing which require a G-tube for feeding, seizures, and degeneration of sight and hearing.

Aaron's mom, Sara, brings Aaron to the Square & Compass Building for treatment of the symptoms he experiences as a result of Undefined Leukodystrophy. They are at the clinic often for appointments with a Neurologist, Physical Therapist, Occupational Therapist, Speech Therapist, Dietician, and Dr. London, Aaron's Pediatrician. Aaron has been a patient at the clinic for over three years and came to the clinic on recommendation, from the El Rio Health Center, as a place that Sara could bring him for all of his health care needs. Sara commented, "All the staff is helpful and the clinic is truly comprehensive care in one place."



Children with Aaron's disease require a lot of costly medical equipment; some covered by insurance and some not. Some of the equipment Aaron needs are a wheelchair. Gait Trainer and Stander, Tomato Chair, Bath Chair, Benik Vest, and a communication device. Equipment such as this is costly and that's where Square & Compass donors, like you, can help a child like Aaron. Square & Compass Children's Clinic funds medically needed items, such as these, when insurance companies won't cover these items and, the cost of them, puts undue burden on families challenged with a child who has a complex medical condition. Each of these pieces of equipment contributes to the overall health and well-being of children like Aaron.

Wheelchairs allow for mobility and independence, a Gait Trainer encourages walking, strengthens muscle tone, and improves balance. Chairs like the Tomato Chair and Bath Chair, allow Aaron to be properly supported so that he can sit and

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
Jared Perkins – Children's Clinics Newest CEO

He became part of an intensive in-home care team through Providence Corporation, where he would go into the homes of children with behavioral problems and counsel them. He worked there for two years and in 2010 he developed a Behavioral Intervention Program which became extremely successful and was the first of its kind in Southern Arizona. In 2011, Jared got his Master's Degree in Public Administration with concentration on healthcare. While going to school, he started working at the U of A. Together with a close colleague he worked on the politics of happiness, studying nine different countries and how they would define happiness as a culture. This developed into a curriculum and became a class, which he and his co-worker taught while he was in school, and was also a part of a technology based education model which was the first at the U of A.

Upon graduating, Jared went back to Providence where he was part of the development of some autism programs. While helping at Providence, he met Jill Bemis and Mimi Coomler, both former CEO's of the Children's Clinics. In 2015, he learned of an opening for Director of Operations at the Clinic and was encouraged by Jill and Mimi to apply, which is how he became part of Children's Clinics. Jared loves

It displays pictures that Aaron can point at to express ideas, desires, and words. All of this costly equipment helps make Aaron's life easier and is necessary to his overall health and well-being.
